#### The Peninsula SPCA Proudly Joins the "Pets for Patriots" Program



Statistics tell us that every day in the US, 18 veterans take their own lives. Pets for Patriots was founded as a charitable, non-profit organization that seeks to unite at-risk shelter animals with individuals from all branches of the armed forces at any stage of their careers, including retirement. They believe that "through the simple act of pet adoption, two lives can be saved and enriched. "

The Peninsula SPCA has become a partner shelter with the Pets for Patriots program. This means that military personnel and veterans who qualify for the program can adopt an at-risk dog or cat from our shelter for a special discounted adoption fee that includes the animal's spay/neuter, initial vaccinations, micro-chipping, and more. The Pets for Patriots program will also provide adopters with discounted veterinary care for their adopted pet and other educational resources. They even provide access to their virtual "pet food bank" for those in need.

Several years ago, the PSPCA's Board of Directors took their lead from you, the citizens of our local community, who said we needed more from our local animal shelter. We needed an organization dedicated to the re-homing of every adoptable animal in our care, an organization that was free to deploy its resources to community education and outreach, an organization lead by its volunteer base and supported by citizens and businesses who understand and value the power of the animal-human bond to enrich lives.

That shelter will be the new Peninsula SPCA Adoption Center, still located at 523 J. Clyde Morris Blvd. in Newport News. In addition to providing temporary homes for adoptable animals, we will continue to have our wonderful Petting and Learning Zoo, our Lily's Den Picnic and Party area, and plenty of "play yards" where our visitors can exercise and interact with our shelter pets. We will begin to offer new learning opportunities for our visitors and prospective pet owners, and will have a wealth of new volunteer roles for the animal lovers of our community.



Once our local municipalities complete and open their new Regional Animal Shelter, the Peninsula SPCA will complete its transition to its new "no kill" operating model. At that time, we will become fully dependent upon the support of our community to keep our "adoption guarantee" shelter thriving.

#### All that "Glitters" is gold for our first PETCOsponsored adoption!

In October of 2013, the Peninsula SPCA was the fortunate recipient of a grant from the PETCO Foundation to help homeless special-needs dogs find new forever families.

PETCO agreed to pay the adoption fees for 16 special-needs dogs from the PSPCA shelter, and to send them to their new homes with a goodie bag of a toy, treat and a PETCO gift certificate.

The first "lucky dog" to benefit from the PETCO grant was a Shih Tzu girl named Glitter. Glitter had been adopted from the Peninsula SPCA several years ago, but had been picked up as a stray by Gloucester County Animal Control, When the animal control officer scanned her for a micro-chip, they found that she had originally come from the Peninsula SPCA. Her owner could not be located and when Glitter was not claimed from the Gloucester animal pound, a volunteer from the Gloucester facility called the Peninsula SPCA to let us know she was there. We picked Glitter up and brought her back to the PSPCA.

Glitter was a sweet and mature pup, about 11 years old, who was very distraught to find herself in a shelter environment. As the PSPCA had just been awarded the PETCO Foundation grant, we knew that Glitter would be our perfect first special-needs adoption candidate due to her age and tremendous distress at being in shelter.

On Glitter's second day of being designated the PETCO Foundation's "Dog of the Week," her wonderful new family found her and fell in love! Since that time, eight other dogs have found their forever homes thanks to the generosity of the PETCO Foundation and the open animalloving hearts in our community.







#### Adoption up in 2013 for our shelter pets!



As the Peninsula SPCA looks ahead to its transition to being an "adoption-guarantee" or "no-kill" animal shelter in 2014, the shelter's adoption results from 2013 show that they're not waiting until then to make some major improvements in the lives of our community's homeless animals!

The PSPCA helped to save the lives of 3384 animals in 2013, through local adoptions and transports to breed rescue groups. They also worked in partnership with local animal control officers to reunite more lost pets with their families. Total adoptions were up 24% in 2013 compared to 2012.

Shelter staff credits the increase to the community's growing awareness of what great pets shelter dogs and cats can be. The shelter also holds regular adoption "specials" to help bring potential pet owners and their "new best friends" together while still minding today's tight budgets.

"We want every adoptable animal in our shelter to find a loving home," said PSPCA Assistant Executive Director Don Branch. "We'll do everything we can to make that happen."
